MYLOFT (OFF - CAMPUS ACCESS TO E-RESOURCES)

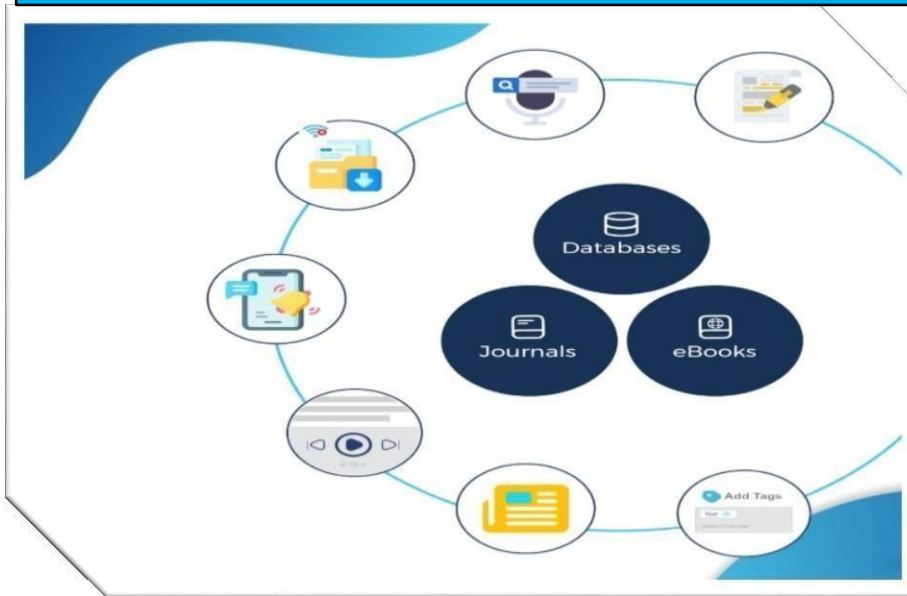
Myloft is an acronym, which stands for, “My library on finger tips” It is an application for organizing, distributing, and gaining access to digital content and e-resources that the library has subscribed to.

MyLOFT is your personal library, where you include the content you need and categorize them the way you like.

A single app that lets you access, arrange, share, and read all of your e-content offline at any time and from any location. Myloft provides access to a wide range of e-resources, including e-books, scholarly

publications, online libraries, as well as research databases. Students and researchers need these tools in order to access the most recent data and academic publications. For instance, Myloft gives users access to platforms such as JSTOR, Sage Research Methods, and Taylor and Francis, which let them examine a huge library of scholarly materials, historical records, and peer-reviewed publications.

Furthermore, Myloft might provide access to particular e-books and online learning resources that are suited to the institution's courses and programs, improving students' entire educational experience.



MYLOFT ACCESS PROCEDURE

- ❖ A page will appear asking you to select your institute.
- ❖ Click on the textbox on the screen and select your institute by scrolling the list given or typing the name. Then, click continue.
- ❖ A login page will appear with text boxes for email and password.

WHY MYLOFT

MYLOFT has features like **offline reading, tagging, saving into collections, sharing articles**, and more that make it easy to access library-subscribed e-resources. Additionally, with the use of a mobile application, users are empowered to easily find, access, save, organize, and share e-content related to their personal and professional interests across online and mobile platforms.

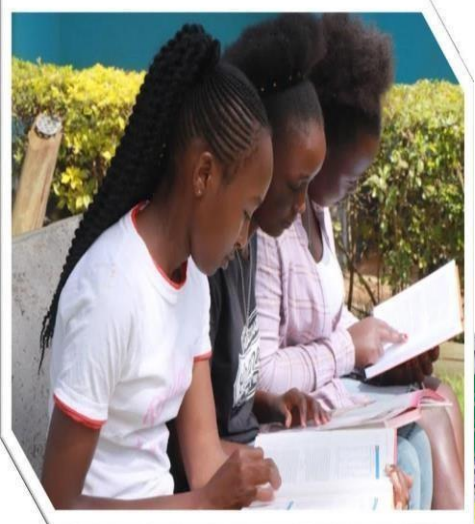
Reviewing literature

AI text summariser tools (both dedicated tools and all-purpose generative AI such as ChatGPT) save librarians time and effort by generating concise summaries of complex information in seconds. These technologies enable rapid access and digestion of essential data, improving efficiency and supporting librarians' ability to manage and curate vast amounts of academic content effectively.

Recommending resources

AI-powered search engines especially ChatGPT, Gemini, and Scite, provide academic librarians access to more accurate and relevant results, significantly enhancing the research process.
